1% Increase Effective November / December 2010

The table below shows the benefit rate amounts for both Ontario Works (OW) and the Ontario Disability Support Program (ODSP) for the periods before and after November / December 2010, to reflect a 1% in Basic Needs and Maximum Shelter rates. The increases will appear on ODSP cheques received in November and OW cheques received in December 2010.

The Ontario Child Benefit (OCB) is also payable to families with dependent children. OCB amounts are included here to provide a sense of total maximum monthly income from these provincial sources. More information about the OCB and the restructuring of social assistance rates is available at on the ISAC website at <u>www.incomesecurity.org</u>.

The 1% increase also applies to the Double Disabled rate, Board and Lodging amounts, Northern Allowances, the Guide Dog Benefit, the Dependents of Dependents amount, benefits to Residents of Interval and Transition Homes, the Advanced Age Amount, the Special Boarder Allowance, the Personal Needs Allowance, Emergency Hostel Per Diems, and the Temporary Care Assistance amount. As well, the Assistance for Children with Severe Disability (ACSD) amount will increase to \$445.


